OUR MOTTO AND MISSION STATEMENT

Our school motto is

**'Today's Learning for
Tomorrow's World'**

and captures the overarching ethos of our school. Our Mission Statement bears out our motto and reads:

'At Gilnahirk Primary School, we seek to provide a happy and caring learning environment for every child. We hope that by helping them realise their potential, celebrating their achievements, respecting their differences and encouraging mutual respect, we will foster self-esteem and provide a solid foundation for their future'.





SCHOOL CURRICULUM

There are three Key Stages within the Primary School:

Years 1 and 2 are the Foundation Stage (FS)

Years 3 and 4 are Key Stage 1 (KS1)

Years 5, 6 and 7 are Key Stage 2 (KS2)

There are seven areas of learning at each of the Key Stages:

- **Language and Literacy (including talking and listening, reading and writing)**
- **Mathematics and Numeracy (focusing on the development of mathematical concepts across the curriculum)**
- **The World Around Us (focusing on the development of skills and knowledge in Geography, History and Science)**
- **The Arts (including art and design, music and drama)**
- **Personal Development and Mutual Understanding (focusing on emotional development, social skills, learning to learn, health, relationships education, understanding in the local and global community)**
- **Physical Education (focusing on the development of knowledge, skills and understanding through play and a range of physical activities)**
- **Religious Education (parents who wish to, may exercise their right to withdraw children from RE lessons and school Assemblies).**



MEETING PUPILS' NEEDS

We strive to ensure that the needs of every child are met at Gilnahirk and we do this in a range of ways, from careful planning to diagnostic testing.

If a child is identified as experiencing difficulties in fully accessing the curriculum, we have robust systems in place to provide relevant support, including:

- In-class differentiation of set tasks
- Team teaching
- Use of additional adult support to assist children
- Personal Learning Plans
- Withdrawal support, provided by our learning support teacher
- Liaison with external agencies, including the Education Authority Special Educational Needs section, the Autism Advisory Support Service, Behaviour Support Team and a range of other agencies.
- Close partnerships with parents.



POSITIVE BEHAVIOUR/CODE OF CONDUCT

At Gilnahirk, we are proud of our positive and caring ethos, in which every child is valued and nurtured, and our school is renowned for high levels of exceptional behaviour from our children.

We ask our children to follow a simple, child-friendly Code of Conduct which is:

- We try to be on time for school and ready for our day's activities.
- We wear our uniform with pride.
- We remember our manners and show kindness to others.
- We take care with our school grounds, buildings and property.
- We always walk in the school building.
- We are careful and sensible when we are playing.

HOMework

We believe homework is useful in consolidating topics covered in school and also provides a link between home and school. Homework practice varies across the key stages, taking account of the children's stage of development. At Foundation Stage and early Key Stage 1, the focus is on sounds, reading, mental maths, spellings and practical tasks. At later Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2, the focus shifts to include more written tasks as well as consolidating reading, spellings and maths facts. We also use an interactive Maths programme to reinforce mathematical concepts at home.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE/ABSENCE

At Gilnahirk, our attendance rates are consistently above the NI averages and the importance of attendance is regularly communicated to parents.

However, we understand that there will inevitably be times when a child needs to take some time off school, due to illness or family circumstances. Where a child is absent from school, parents must ensure that the reason for their absence is communicated to school when they return. This is important for accurate recording of attendance rates.



AFTER SCHOOL/ EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

We offer a vibrant and varied after school activities programme for children right across the Key Stages.

These activities are a mix of teacher led clubs (provided free of charge) and externally provided clubs, which require a fee. These clubs include, amongst others:

We also offer extra curricular music tuition during the school day in strings, brass, woodwind and percussion.



EDUCATIONAL VISITS

Educational Visits play a crucial role in the life of Gilnahirk, which can be of great value to children both educationally and socially. These include day trips to exciting places, linked to class topics, like Carrickfergus Castle, Belvoir Forest Park, Ulster Museum, Titanic Museum and many others.

In Year 6 children are given the opportunity to experience a short residential stay at an outdoor pursuits' centre and then in Year 7 they are given the opportunity to cap off their time at Gilnahirk with an amazing trip to Edinburgh, visiting a range of attractions across the city.

WRAP AROUND CARE

Wrap around care is currently provided by Sleepy Hollow, who meet in the mobile classroom beside the school canteen. They are open from 8.00am for parents who need to do an early drop off and until 6pm for parents who require childcare after school. Places should be booked directly with Sleepy Hollow.

PUPIL ADMISSIONS

Our admissions number is 60. It is the school's policy that only children of compulsory school age will be admitted. If the school is oversubscribed in any given year, pupils will be admitted by the criteria being applied in the order listed in the leaflet at the back of this prospectus.



PARENTAL INVOLVEMENT/ PARENTS' ASSOCIATION

As a school, we acknowledge that the partnership between home and school is crucial. To that end, we encourage active parental participation in the life of the school. This participation takes many forms, including volunteering for reading partnership, assisting with practical tasks around the school, supervising during school day trips and many other things.

We also have an active Parents' Association which has a long and successful history of raising funds for much needed extras in the school. Over the years, the Parents' Association have provided things like Promethean Activpanels for classrooms, lighting for school productions, sports equipment and outside play equipment. Most recently, parents' association fundraising has allowed us to completely refurbish our ICT suite and school library, create a new sensory space and KS2 break out space, repaint some classrooms and our Foundation Stage indoor play area and build a bespoke outdoor play area for our Year 1 and 2 children.




REPORTING TO PARENTS

Over the course of a school year, parents are provided with two opportunities to meet their child's class teacher, usually at the end of October and at the start of March. BOARD OF GOVERNORS

The Board of Governors consists of representatives of the Education Authority, Transferors, parents and staff. It has responsibility for the management of the school and acts in close cooperation with the Principal, who is Secretary to the Board of Governors. The breakdown of membership is two EA representatives, four transferors, two parent representatives and one teacher representative.
